## Claudette Bradshaw challenges IODE

Claudette Bradshaw, retired Federal Minister of Labour, spoke at the 108<sup>th</sup> National Annual Meeting in St. Andrews by-the-Sea, NB. Ms Bradshaw represented the federal government in 2000 at the Centennial Annual Meeting when she accepted IODE's gift to Canada, the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Grant Program to alleviate child abuse and neglect. On this occasion, she touched and inspired us to address a problem that has solutions.

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS), Fetal Alcohol Effect (FAE) and dyslexia are the three most prevalent reasons children fail in school. She challenged us to learn more about children with these disorders. FAS/FAE are disorders of permanent birth defects that occur in children whose mothers drink during pregnancy. Safe levels of alcohol consumption during pregnancy are unknown. FAS and FAE children might show poor memory, attention disorder, impulsive behavior, later health problems and drug addiction.

Dyslexia is a disorder in children who, despite conventional classroom experience, fail to attain language skills in reading, writing

and spelling commensurate with their intellectual abilities.

FAS/FAE and dyslexic students often drop out of school and as adults fail at low paying jobs and make up a large proportion of the homeless and incarcerated population. It doesn't have to be that way. "We can do something about it," Ms Bradshaw told members. "Early identification, specific teaching methods, counselling and training are needed so these children may live productive lives."

Ms Bradshaw challenged IODE to learn more about the disorders. "Members of IODE should use their influence with universities, schools, hospitals and law enforcement agencies. You can play a role in promoting the understanding of these disorders and be an advocate for teacher training which will result in better outcomes for these children. Adoptive parents also need help to succeed with children who may be affected."

FAS/FAE and dyslexic adults form a large portion of illiterate Canadians. Ms Bradshaw challenged us to take care of the children, all the children, including FAS/FAE and dyslexic kids.

The Bestowal of Charter Ceremony for **IODE Shore of Nine Points Chapter** was held on Founder's Day, 13 February in Kelligrews, Conception Bay South (CBS), NL. Special guests were Elizabeth Marshall and Terry French, members of the House of Assembly for Topsail and Conception Bay South respectively and Mayor Woodrow French.

### KATHLEEN JULIA (JUDY) CRAIK

Born in Toronto, 25 April 1929, one would be hard pressed to find someone who more fully lived the motto "to whom much has been given, much is expected". Judy passed away on 05 July 2008.

At the age of 11, she began her lifelong work on behalf of IODE joining **IODE Constance Waugh Chapter**. In her 68 years of IODE membership she actively participated at every level, including two years as President of **IODE Canada** from 1976 to 1978 and a three year term as President of **IODE Ontario** from 1969 to 1972. Judy was the third member of her family to be National President. Judy's great-aunt, Lady Gooderham, was President from 1911 to 1919, and her mother, Kathleen Drope, was President from 1953 to 1955. Her grandmother, Mrs. M. Ross Gooderham, served as National Organizing Secretary.

Judy was an energetic and dynamic person who cared deeply for people. She exhibited great passion for helping to improve the lives of others and the less fortunate. At the time of her death, Judy was serving IODE as a trustee for the Board of Management, IODE Children's Centre, North York General Hospital and as the Honorary President and valued, active member of **IODE Kathleen Drope Chapter**, Toronto, the chapter named in honour of her mother.

# HIGHLIGHTS OF NATIONAL PRESIDENT'S SPEECH

President Chris Bateman welcomed everyone and thanked the members in New Brunswick for hosting the meeting. She recalled that 25 years ago the 83<sup>rd</sup> National Annual Meeting was held in this same hotel and commented that members “met to discuss ways and means of investing in the future of IODE”.

Chris continued, “Together we are charting a new course for IODE – one that will transform the way we promote ourselves and *Sea the Future* of IODE. We have completed two years of our great and glorious adventure together, an adventure that reflects on our commitment to renewal, builds on our strengths and engages our members. The roadmap for this adventure was a new strategic plan to influence the direction IODE would take focusing on the priorities referred to the incoming officers in 2006...

Following suggestions of the Strategic Planning Committee, the officers were expected to redesign and transform many things without changing the fundamental values upon which this organization was founded. This was a tall order indeed, but the National Officers were up to the challenge and have continued the journey...to see the organization not as it is, but as it can become...

You asked that we explore further avenues of raising the image of IODE at all levels. Public Relations Officer Ann Dyer

will introduce many public relations tools which have been prepared to assist you in increasing public awareness and membership. One of our strategic objectives was to remain mission driven... The purpose of IODE, our *raison d'être*, should be the driving force behind all our actions. We should structure all programs, rules and regulations around our Mission Statement...

Forward thinking strategic planning will take a look at where we were, where we are today and where we hope to be. We have formed a Focus on the Future Committee...to provide our members and our organization with the skills, tools and opportunities to scale new heights and reach a new pinnacle of success as we approach our 110<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and continue into the next decade...

The National Officers have worked diligently to create a clear vision of short and long-range objectives and goals that will benefit IODE and those we help. We all need a willingness to embrace new ideas, an openness to new information, even if opposed to our established thoughts, and a willingness to be flexible when evidence suggests flexibility and change are required. We encourage you to *Sea the Future* of IODE. As members, your insight is especially valuable. What are your hopes and dreams for our organization?”

### ■ EDUCATION – Born to Read

New Brunswick *Born To Read* Coordinator Shirley Downey shared her longstanding enthusiasm and commitment to literacy. *Born To Read* began in 1991 in St. Stephen, by delivering books to 100 babies. In 1994, with then Provincial President Gladys Moore’s encouragement, it became a provincial program. In 1998, it caught the attention of Lieutenant Governor Marilyn Trenholme Counsell MD who offered personal support. As with many IODE initiatives, government has stepped in to assist and about 8,000 babies annually receive a *Born to Read* filled book bag. *Born to Read* has partnered with industry and government agencies and since 2004 the Early Childhood Centre, University of New Brunswick. A contest is held annually to select a manuscript to be illustrated and published as a *Born to Read* book for ages 0-2. The prize is \$2,500 with the promise of 6,000 book orders.



### ■ CITIZENSHIP – Soldier ON!

Jessica Hood, Health Promotion Manager, CFB Gagetown, NB, presented an overview of the Soldier ON! program. This program supports serving and retired Canadian Forces personnel, with a physical or mental disability, and helps them to return to physical activity, recreation or sport. A customized program assists them to return to military service or transition to civilian life.

## ■ **LABRADOR – New Video**

Those present were eager that all members have an opportunity to view the video and recommended that DVD copies be sent to all primary chapters.

IODE members enhance lives by supporting students and schools with awards, scholarships, bursaries and educational supplies. IODE members do make a difference in Labrador. Chris and Catherine gained a first-hand understanding of the distinct lifestyle of Labradoreans. Programs are based on traditional community beliefs and cultural practices including arts, crafts and music.

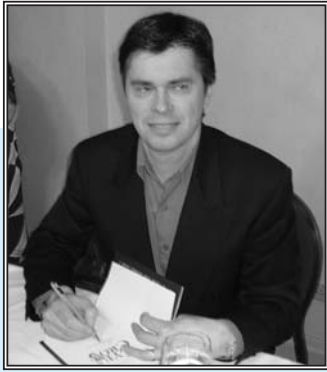
### **New PR Fund**

## Eye of the Crow wins Violet Downey Book Award

*Eye of the Crow* won The National Chapter of Canada IODE Violet Downey Book Award for children's literature published in 2007. Author Shane Peacock received his \$3,000 award and chatted with members while autographing books.

In his novel he creates a background story for Sherlock Holmes, the world's greatest detective, revealing his early detection skills. The reader is drawn into the street life of Victorian London in the 1860s and the adventures of 13-year-old Sherlock. A woman is brutally murdered in a dark alley in the foggy East End of the city, and no one sees the crime...except two crows.

Corporal Jeffrey Bodner, a member of the RCMP for 26 years, received The National Chapter of Canada IODE (RCMP) Police Community Relations Award for 2008. ## AUCTION BENEFITS NEW BRUNSWICK FLOOD VICTIMS



Lieutenant Governor Herménégilde Chiasson attended the Saturday night National Chapter dinner. A well-known Acadian visual artist, playwright, poet, filmmaker, curator, lecturer and academic, His Honour contributed one of his wood-cuts, *Everyday Angels*, that inspired a silent auction to benefit NB flood victims.

"Angels have always been an inspiration to me," said His Honour. "They guide us, watch over us, stimulate and encourage us. They offer solace, safety, a sense of security and spirituality."

The \$1,855 raised in this auction during the National Annual Meeting augments the \$3,500 designated from IODE's Canadian Disaster Fund. IODE New Brunswick will use the \$5,355 to purchase gift cards for those in need.



## Kindness is Core

Senator Marilyn Trenholme Counsell, MD, former Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick and Primary Life Member of IODE Lord Sackville Chapter, Sackville, NB, spoke at the Friday luncheon. As Lieutenant Governor in the year 2000, she hosted delegates at her official residence,

Old Government House, Fredericton.

Senator Trenholme Counsell emphasized that the "need for your good deeds and your unshakeable vision are greater today than they were in 1900. Loneliness, poverty, families and communities in which the ties that bind are weaker, all this and more, remain the reason for generosity and human kindness that is the very core of IODE."

- Stylized badge (1975)
- IODE corporate logo (1984)
- Canadian Flag voted the flag of the National Chapter (1987)

Anticipating IODE's second century, consultant Jane Conlin was hired. She suggested a three-year plan of wide-ranging changes. Many changes were made:

- citizenship membership requirements
- switching from a delegated vote to one member one vote
- utilizing modern technology

Self-examination took place in 2005 via a broadly circulated questionnaire. National Officers and Provincial Presidents brainstormed over the material resulting in six recommendations:

- to reduce and simplify reporting procedures
- to provide members with tools to promote IODE
- to institute new methods of attracting members to IODE
- to investigate social issues relevant to our mission and initiate new programs
- to promote citizenship programs in our multicultural society
- to raise the image of IODE

## MONEY MATTERS\$

• **National Per Member Levy:** A National Per Member Levy of \$5 was approved in the IODE Canada 2008 budget. This levy will be paid from primary chapter funds beginning in the fall of 2008.
